Syllabus Topics in International Pharmacy

Faculty

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Course Description

This course will engage students in discussions relating to international healthcare and pharmacy practice as well as strengths, challenges, and opportunities in pharmacy and healthcare in global settings. The discussions will be facilitated via readings, web-based resources, and online guest, faculty, and student presentations.

Learning Objectives

In this course, students will:

- 1. Discuss differences and similarities between pharmacy and healthcare in the country you have presented, the United States, and other countries presented by classmates and guest lecturers in the course.
- 2. Explain how healthcare system structure affects pharmacy and healthcare services for patients and providers.
- 3. Explain how a healthcare opportunity/challenge/issue of your choosing was created by or is impacted by the healthcare system of the country you have selected.
- 4. Compare how the opportunity/challenge/issue is handled in other countries that have been presented through discussions.
- 5. Propose solutions for the challenge/issue identified or how to integrate the opportunity identified to optimize health and pharmacy systems in the proposed country or the US.

Teaching Methods

The methods used in this course involve online presentations and discussions. Through a series of guest and faculty lectures, students will be introduced to pharmacy in several countries where the presenter currently practices or has spent significant amounts of time in that country as a pharmacist, patient, or academic partner. By providing examples of presentations, students will be given ideas and examples for the creation of their own presentation about a country of their choosing. Through presentations and facilitation of discussion, students will enhance their knowledge of pharmacy in another country and share thoughts, ideas, and reactions with classmates to enhance understanding and appreciation for pharmacy in other healthcare systems. These active learning strategies will also give students the ability to practice facilitating multidisciplinary, online discussions, a method often used when participating in international thought exchanges and collaborations.

Depending of the size of enrollment for the class, the class may be divided into two groups for the student presentation portion of the course. Both groups will aim to have a mix of studentsfrom the BSPS, PharmD, and other health science programs.

Assessments

- 1. Country/topic presentation
- 2. Discussion facilitation/supplemental resource
- 3. Discussion participation
- 4. Presenter surveys
- 5. Seminar paper
- 6. Reflective Essay

Country/Topic Presentations: Each student will create a <u>20-30 minute</u> presentation on pharmacy in another country and/or a topic related to pharmacy or healthcare in the chosen country in consultation with the course instructor (note: each presenter is required to cover a country not previously discussed in class).

- Country and topic selections are due for review by *Friday January 28 at 11:59PM*.
 - Each student should submit <u>three</u> countries/topics and <u>three</u> potential presentation weeks for their presentation
 - One topic and one week will be chosen by the instructor to avoid duplication.

- o Topics will be reviewed and approved by <u>Tuesday February 1st at 5PM</u>.
 - Country/topic selection and preferred dates for presentation at the discretion of faculty.
 - In order to distribute presentations throughout the course, assignment of preferred dates may not be possible.
- Presentation submission: Completed presentations should be submitted to the instructor by the *Wednesday prior* to the assigned presentation week by 11:59PM.
 - Example: Presentations assigned for the week of February 14 should be submitted by 11:59PM on Wednesday February 9, presentations for the week of February 21 should be submitted by 11:59PM Wednesday February 16, etc.
- Suggestions for organizing your presentation include the following:
 - 1. Pharmacy/Healthcare Practices in Other Countries
 - a. What is the structure of the country's healthcare system?
 - b. Who funds the healthcare system?
 - c. What are the major healthcare/medication issues?
 - d. How are pharmacists trained?
 - e. What is the role of the pharmacist?
 - f. How does pharmacy practice in the country you have studied differ from the U.S.?
 - 2. Global Pharmaceutical/Healthcare Strength, Challenge, or Opportunity
 - a. What is the nature and scope of the topic you are presenting?
 - b. What role do/could pharmaceuticals play in causing or improving this problem/issue?
 - c. What model initiatives exist for addressing this problem/issue?
 - d. What implications does this problem/issue have for global health?
 - e. What direct impact does the issue have on healthcare workers and patients?
- Students from non-pharmacy disciplines are invited to focus their presentation differently if desired. The use of medications in the country being presented should remain the primary emphasis, but students should feel free to draw connections to their own field of study as well. For example, public health students may wish to relate the use of medications to important public health concerns in the country being presented.
 - Students wishing to take this different approach to their presentation should discuss their ideas with the course instructor.
- All students should review the Carmen web resources and any other useful materials to get a basic understanding of the countries to be discussed each week.
- The assessment rubric used for the presentation can be found on Carmen.

Discussion Facilitation/Supplemental Resource: Each student presenting will be responsible for facilitating a discussion based on the country/topic presented during the week of their presentation and providing a supplemental resource that complements the presentation and informs discussion.

- The discussion facilitator (that week's presenter) will be responsible for determining a prompt statement/question, moderating, and guiding the discussion.
- The discussion facilitator should send the supplemental resource link/file in with the discussion prompt to the Carmen drop box with their discussion prompt.

- The discussion facilitator should have their discussion prompt to the course instructors the *Wednesday* prior to their assigned presentation week with their presentation for uploading into Carmen.
 - Example: Discussion facilitation prompt and supplemental resource assigned for the week of *February 14* should be submitted by *Wednesday February 9*, etc.
- For online discussion facilitation suggestions, please see the resources on Carmen.

Discussion Participation: Students will be responsible for participating in the discussions posted each week relating to the presentations.

- Students participating in the discussion are responsible for <u>2 contributions</u> to <u>each</u> discussion board on <u>2 separate days</u> each week OR <u>1 video post</u>.
- Discussions will <u>open on Monday at 8:00AM</u> each week and <u>close on Saturday at 11:59PM</u>. Participation for the week will be determined the Monday after the discussion posts are due and will be for contributions made prior to the Saturday 11:59PM deadline.
- For written discussion option:
 - Your first discussion contribution(s) should be made by <u>Wednesday</u> each week and the second contribution(s) <u>before the Saturday deadline</u> to facilitate an active discussion.
 - Two separate contributions should be posted as two separate replies or thread posts, not within the same post.
- For the video post option:
 - You video post must be uploaded before the <u>deadline on Saturday</u>.
- Satisfactory grades for the course will require completion of 85% of discussion contributions and presenter surveys. This allows for a couple of "unexcused absences" before your grade is affected.
 - Each discussion contribution is worth 0.5 points and each video post worth 1 point.
 - Note: The student responsible for facilitating the discussion will not be assessed for participation in their own discussion. See above for facilitation responsibilities. The student facilitating a discussion will still be responsible for participation in the other discussion during the week if there are 2 groups in the course.

Presenter Surveys: For each week of student presentations (starting in week 7), there will be a survey for each student presenter to provide feedback for the presentation.

- Students not providing the presentation are responsible for filling out surveys for each presenter (2 each week starting week 7).
- Satisfactory grades for the course will require completion of 85% of discussion contributions and presenter surveys. This allows for a couple of "absences" before your grade is affected.
 - o Each presenter feedback survey is worth 1 point.
- Presenter surveys assigned for the week should be completed by <u>Saturday at 11:59PM</u> each week.
- The template for presenter surveys can be found on Carmen. The surveys will be available via Qualtrics online software in a link provided in each week's module.

Seminar Paper: Each student will prepare and submit a <u>2-3 page</u> paper (excluding references) relating to their presentation topics. Topics for the seminar paper will be approved by the instructor.

- Example topics: an in-depth focus of how the topic affects healthcare in the chosen country, current innovations or solutions for pharmacy in another country that are applicable to your country or topic, how the topic discussed impacts other countries discussed in the class, how the topic came to be, etc.
- Topics for seminar papers are due for review by <u>Wednesday February 23 at</u> 11:59PM.
 - o Topics will be reviewed and approved by *Friday February 25 at 5PM*.
- Seminar papers are due on <u>Wednesday April 6 at 11:59PM</u>.
- References will not be included in the page limit.
- Guidelines for the seminar paper can be found on Carmen.

Reflective Essay: The reflective essay in this course is designed to get students thinking about how the principles and concepts discussed relate to their professional and personal lives and evaluate their ability to make meaningful connections between the course material and set individual goals for the course.

- The reflective essay should be 1 page, double-spaced, 12 point Times New Roman or Arial font with 1 inch margins.
- The reflective essay will be assigned on *Sunday April 10*.
- The reflective essay is due on Wednesday April 20 at 11:59PM.
- A guide for writing reflections can be found on Carmen.

Grading:

Satisfactory (S) – satisfactory completion of presentation, supplemental resource, discussion facilitation, seminar paper, and course reflection with >85% participation (discussion contribution and survey completion) Unsatisfactory (U) – lack of satisfactory completion of presentation, supplemental resource, discussion, facilitation, seminar paper, and/or course reflection OR <85% participation (discussion contribution and survey completion)

Honor System for Doctor of Pharmacy Students:
